GARDENING

AUTUMN AT CLOCK POND

After the breakfast club on Saturday 5th October, a work party gathered to weed around the new hedging planted earlier in the year. Together with some clearing behind the 'copse' area to make it easier for walkers to venture around this area. The rough grass next to the pond has developed well to provide shelter for the newts and invertebrates. Our recent higher rainfall has also raised the water level.



The Mallard ducklings have fully grown and left the pond. Hopefully they will give the pond a rest next year as the Water Lilly was completely eaten by them this year. Suffolk Wildlife Trust has identified that ducks significantly reduce the wildlife value of a pond especially for priority species like newts. Fingers crossed for next year and if they do return we MUST avoid feeding them. There will also be additional planting of pond sedges, a marginal plant that helps provide shelter for invertebrates that ducks don't eat.

The pond continues to be visited by a variety of dragonflies, damselflies and darters. And the hornets continue to build their nest in and on the bird box well into October but this should stop very soon. Please have a look at the pond and let me know of what you find.

Her nursery specialises in growing healthy, hardy, perennial plants that will give years of pleasure but can't necessarily be found in your average local garden centre. They have been exhibiting at RHS shows such as Hampton Court Palace since 2007 and in 2012, they exhibited at Chelsea for the first time and were awarded a Silver-Gilt Medal for their efforts, going on to win Gold in 2017 & 2018.

K6 PROJECT

The K6 project is an adventure up and down the country to find old red telephone boxes and adopt and repurpose them.

Finding working red phone boxes is a challenge. As BT battles to control its costs, the boxes are quickly disappearing from public sight. The British icon has become history, there is, however, a future in adopting and repurposing them. The K6 project aims to visit as many local telephone boxes as they can throughout the country to find out what communities do to repurpose them.

The project has visited almost 6,000 boxes and has found multiple uses for them, such as, a defibrillator site, recycling centres, local book exchanges and local village guide booths. The project visited Brockley on 15th September 2023 and noticed a trend among more rural boxes all based around being 'local centric'.
